CASTLE DALE—Duane, four year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Day, of Los Angeles, Calif., and a grandson of Edwin S. Day, pioneer Castle Dale resident, is started well on the road to child-stardom in the cinema world of Hollywood. In an interesting letter from the child's mother to relatives here, she writes:

"Duane had a four weeks run in making the picture, 'That Certain Woman,' with Betty Davis and Henry Fonda. The picture was completed two weeks ago and it usually takes from five to six weeks for completing the cutting, etc. The assistant director is going to let me know when the preview will be ready. Hope it is soon, as I am rather anxious to see it.

"They all thought a lot of Duane. The director Edmund

Goulding, gave him a drum which they all autographed. They presented him with a lovely coat-sweater. Betty Davis with a balloon-tired tryke which he had used in the picture."

From the Los Angeles Evening News: "Four-year-old Duane Day who plays Henry Fonda's son in 'That Certain Woman' is the pride and joy of the cast and crew. It's his first picture and the camera and technical crew predict that he'll be another Coogan sensation. Whenever he hears the warning bell, usually sounded before going into a 'take,' little Duane screams 'Quiet' at the top of his lungs, no matter where he may be on the set."
